Worcester Public Schools students participated in the Youth Climate Summit on Saturday, January 28, 2023 at Broad Meadow Brook. Students from Doherty, North. Burncoat and Shrewsbury ioined representatives from the Boston Nature Center for a day of learning and fun.

Students heard from panelists on the causes and impacts of climate change. They also took a



"sustainability tour" of the Broad Meadow Brook wildlife sanctuary and facilities. Some students participated in an "artivism" project by making colorful prints on recycled t-shirt fabric. Each group/team began making plans for a Climate Action Project, which they will develop and conduct in the spring before reconvening and sharing their actions. Students served as Summit planners, tour leaders, panel moderators, and emcees.

Studying The Past To Prepare For The Future

"You can't take the teacher out of me." Maybe it's a calling, for sure it is passion, and it is fortunate for the children of Worcester that 14 retired teachers engage them with local history through the Worcester Historical Museum's Culture LEAP program, Building Community: Having a Place and a Voice. In a recent interview with Angela Casey and Sharvn Eaton, both Worcester Public Schools retired teachers and both alumnae from the district. North and South Highs respectively, the women became teacher docents for the Museum because they



miss the classroom, love the children, and are delighted to lead fifth graders through local history.

The students, well prepared in the classroom before they arrive at the museum, are warmly welcomed by LEAP teachers. There they learn about items invented in Worcester, including horseshoes, the rat trap, the jukebox, and of course, the internationally recognized smiley face. For so many students, this opportunity would not be possible without the generous funding of two local foundations, and commonly heard from the kids is, "This is the best day of my life."

Culture LEAP (Learning through Arts Partnerships) is a collaborative initiative among the Worcester Public Schools and cultural institutions, funded by the George I. Alden Trust and The Stoddard Charitable Trust and facilitated by the Worcester Educational Development Foundation. This year, more than 24,000 Worcester students will participate. The Worcester Historical Museum is the only institution devoted to local history. The program is managed by the Museum's William Wallace and Lynn Soucy.
